Celebrating God's Sovereignty - Acts 12:1-25

1. Introduction

- The Bible emphasizes both divine sovereignty and human responsibility. The Lord reigns, but we are not mere puppets.
- "God has an eternal and all-embracing plan, which cannot be defeated and will result in His glory and the good of His people".

2. God's purposes are inscrutable (1-4)

- Herod Agrippa was a psychotic murderer like his grandfather Herod the Great (Matthew 2:16-18) and uncle Herod Antipas.
- He was a playboy who persecuted the church in order to secure the favour of the Jewish authorities (1-2).
- James was the brother of John and one of Jesus' inner circle (Matthew 26:36-37). He is the first Apostle to be martyred his brother John was last. Herod arrests Peter in order to destroy the church.
- We cannot understand God's purposes why does he allow the church to suffer? Why do evil men flourish? The mystery of providence.

3. God's power is invincible (5-11)

- The church prayed passionately and God sent an angel (5-7). The angel delivered Peter from Herod's clutches (11).
- It is Passover (3) and 12:11 echoes Exodus 18:4 God delivered his people from bondage in Egypt. God delivers us by his power alone (Exodus 14:13-14).
- This is a picture of salvation "My chains fell off; my heart was free. I rose went forth and followed thee." (Galatians 1:4; Colossians 1:13-14).
- God does not always deliver his people from danger James died. However we can be confident that his power is invincible.

4. God's provision is incredible (12-17)

- a) God uses our prayers
 - The rescue of Peter is the result of the prayers of the church (5, 12). The angel brought Peter but prayer brought the angel.
 - Prayer is vital to the health and well being of the church (Acts 4:23-31). Prayer is laying our needs before God (2 Kings 19:14).
- b) God exceeds our expectations
 - The church does not expect their prayers to be answered and what follows is almost farcical (13-15). They are amazed when they realize it is Peter (16). He goes on to other ministry (Galatians 2:11 Antioch).
 - God loves to do more than we imagine (Ephesians 3:20-21)

5. God's plans are irresistible (18-25)

- God always punishes the evil (18-23). The Jewish historian Josephus tells us that Herod dressed in silver robes and accepted the praise of his subjects. He died in agony 7 days later.
 - \Rightarrow Sin defies God it claims the glory that belongs to him alone.
 - \Rightarrow Sin is stupid if you take on Jesus you will lose.
- God always prospers the good (24-25). The word spreads (breadth) and flourishes (depth). World mission is launched (12:25-13:3)
- At the start of the story Satan is victorious; Herod is triumphant; James is dead; Peter is in prison and the church is in retreat.
- By the end of the story Satan is in retreat; Herod is dead; Peter is free; the church is amazed and encouraged and the word is victorious.
