Ephesians 2:11-18 – Union with Christ

A. Introduction

- Paul continues to remind us of the spiritual blessing we have through Christ (1:3) – in Ephesians 1-3 he is opening the treasure chest.
- The gospel affects us personally (2:1-10) and corporately (2:11-22).
- He here addresses the Gentile majority in the church in Ephesus.

B. Alienation – the problem you faced (2:11-12)

Paul paints a very grim picture Gentiles without Christ.

❖ They were the "uncircumcised" (2:11)

- This was a sneer Jews treated Gentiles with contempt and animosity.
- They should have been a light to the Gentiles but instead they treated them with contempt (Genesis 12:1-3; Isaiah 49:6).
- The division between them was symbolized by the wall that prevented Gentiles from entering the temple on pain of death,

There was truth behind the sneers (2:12) They were:

- Christ-less they did not know that there was a Saviour.
- **State-less** they were like aliens looking on from outside.
- *Friend-less* they knew nothing of the God's promises in the Covenants and the Bible was a closed book to them.
- **Hope-less** they lived in fear of death nothing pierced the gloom.
- God-less they had many gods, they did not know the true God.

C. Transformation – the friendship you enjoy (2:13-15)

* "But now" - God brought them near through the blood of Christ

- They know Christ as their Saviour and king they are AD not BC.
- They belong to God's kingdom and are no longer aliens.
- The **promises** of the Covenant have become theirs.
- They have a sure and certain *hope* (1 Peter 1:3-5).
- They know **God** and have assurance of a relationship with Him.
- The blessings promised to Israel have become theirs through Christ and His death on the cross.

Christ did this – He is our peace (2:14-15)

- He abolishing the barrier between Jews and Gentiles. The ceremonial law – food laws, washings, circumcision – acted as a barrier between them. When He died on the cross Jesus abolished these things (2:14).
- He created a new humanity which superseded everything that had gone before (2 Corinthians 5:17; Galatians 3:28; 6:15).

D. Reconciliation – the intimacy you experience (2:16-18)

❖ He reconciled both Jews and Gentiles to God (2:16)

- His death also destroyed the sin that separated humans from God (Colossians 1:20-22).
- This was symbolized by the tearing of the temple curtain (Matthew 27:50-54).

❖ He preached this message of peace (2:17)

- He preached peace when He rose from the dead (John 20:19-23).
- We are called to preach the gospel of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:11-6:2).

❖ We now have an intimate relationship with the triune God (2:18)

- Prayer involves us in the eternal loving relationship of the Trinity.
- We come to the *Father*, through the *Son*, in the power of the *Holy Spirit*.
